Healey Hall Mill

- 1813 Robert Leach and Jacob Tweedale went into partnership as Woollen Manufacturers (see Rochdale Observer article 24.8.1985 and newspaper article "Rearing of a New Mill").
- 1818 Listed as Flannel and Baize Manufacturers.
- 1819/1820 see Spotland Survey for Healey Hall, pg. 43.
- 1828 Rochdale Association of Journeyman Weavers & Spinners called a general stoppage when Tweedale installed improved spinning machinery. It was the start of a long and bitter struggle, which the mill owners eventually won. This led to increased mechanisation in the Rochdale area (see Rochdale Observer article as above).
- 1834 see Spotland Survey, for Healey Bottoms, pg. 55.
- 1847 Jacob Tweedale and Sons.
- 1899 Charles Heap of Caldershaw bought it for £3,750 but keeping the name of the original company, Samuel Heap & Son Ltd., to add to 5 other mills. Production began in 1901 as Bleachers, Dyers, Finishers and Sizers after alterations to the original mill. Until WW1 the mill was unprofitable, then with the demand for army blankets, they were working day and night. In 1915 a new system for dying artificial silk (Rayon) was installed. It remained profitable throughout the 1920's finishing wool, cotton and the new artificial fibres. There was a decline in demand due to the Depression and in 1930 a firm of industrial consultants were called in for advice. They recommended a 25% reduction in labour costs. Economies were made, but in 1935 the mill closed and production of the profitable lines were transferred to the Caldershaw mill. (See "A History of Samuel Heap & Son Ltd. 1823 1964." - 1942 the empty mill was sold to the Ministry of Supply and used until 1949 as a filling factory.
- 1960 Arnold Greaves (Rustproofing) Ltd. let the mill to 12 small businesses.
- 1975 there was a fire at the unit occupied by Ellidge and Fairley, Catering Engineers (see Rochdale Observer article 1.2.1975).
- 1975 part of the building had become unsafe and was demolished (see Rochdale Observer article 22.10.1975).



2005 – permission was granted to build houses on part of the site. The Friends of Healey Dell Group objected (see Rochdale Observer 10.8.05 & 19.11.05).
